

Pupil Premium

St John's CE Primary School Pupil Premium Expenditure

Pupil Premium is an allocation of funding provided to schools to support children who may be vulnerable to underachievement.

The Pupil Premium Grant includes pupils on the annual census known to have been eligible for free school meals in any of the previous six years, as well as those eligible at the time of the census. It also includes pupils who have been eligible for the Service child premium at any point in the last three years.

It is now also inclusive of the grant for any pupils who are or were previously 'Looked After Children'

All schools are required to report on the amount of funding and how this is being used.

The Governing Body of St John's have decided that this grant will be most effectively spent on supporting children's learning in the classroom by **providing**

- **High quality first teaching supported by quality professional development;**
- **Curriculum support;**
- **Targeted intervention;**
- **Engagement and enrichment activities; including music and clubs and**
- **Pastoral support and intervention.**

As with all children at St John's, to ensure maximum impact the needs of children entitled to the Pupil Premium are clearly identified, steps are taken to meet their individual needs and their progress is closely monitored, by teachers on a daily basis and by the senior management team half termly, throughout their time with our school. Where small group / 1:1 support is felt to be most beneficial Pupil Premium will be used to support this provision.

Principles

Teaching and learning at St John's is designed to meet the individual needs of all children.

- We ensure that appropriate provision is made for children who belong to vulnerable groups and that socially disadvantaged children have their needs adequately assessed and met.
- We recognise that not all children who receive free school meals will be socially disadvantaged and we also recognise that not all children that are disadvantaged have free school meals.
- We will allocate Pupil Premium funding after a needs analysis to identify priority groups and individuals.

St John's Pupil Premium Grant for 2013-14 is £12336

Our Pupil Premium grant for 2013/14 is based on FSM (Ever 6) children Service children and a Looked After Child.

Funding is allocated individually, but provision varies according to age, individual needs and interests. The following is a list of how the Pupil Premium has been allocated this year.

- High quality professional development for Teachers and Teaching Assistants to ensure children are taught using the most effective teaching methods;
- Additional Teaching Assistant support in classrooms;
- Additional individual or small group intervention activities;
- Weekly Forest School sessions in Early Years;
- Individual or small group intervention activities, e.g nurture group for phonics, reading and maths;
- Intervention programmes focused on writing and maths, such as sentence construction, number gym and targeted math
- Intervention groups, outside of lesson times, for reading, phonics, writing and/or maths (as appropriate);
- Target intervention groups: writing and maths
- Funding educational visits, breakfast club, lunchtime clubs and extra-curricular clubs;
- Extra resources to support and extend phonics, reading and maths skills
- Additional individual or small group intervention programmes focused on reading, e.g. Maths tutor, teacher support for guided reading and maths projects;
- Raising pupil aspirations through engagement/aspiration programmes such as funded educational visits/extra-curricular activities and subsidised musical instrument tuition (as appropriate)

Data for the cohorts needs to take into account the low numbers of pupils eligible for FSM. This table shows that the attainment gap between children eligible for free school meal (FSM) and children who aren't eligible for free school meals (Non-FSM) is varied but consistently positive (2011: +26%, 2012:+10%, 2013:+19%).

However, due to the small number of children eligible in this year, these results have to be treated with caution.

The difference in attainment between children eligible for FSM and non-FSM children ranges from +3.0 points to +4.8 points. One whole level is equivalent to 6 points.

Our challenge for 2013/14 is to ensure that FSM pupils continue to be well supported and also to build the capacity of those pupils who are not eligible for FSM.
