

Pupil Premium

Pupil Premium funding is allocated by the government to help schools ensure that children who might be disadvantaged are enabled to make appropriate progress in their learning.

The 2012-2013 Pupil Premium funding received by our school was £9722 and for 2013-14 was £12936.

Our funding for 2014-15 school year is calculated like this:

- £1300 for each child eligible for Free School Meals (FSM)
- £300 for each child whose parents/carers are in the forces
- £1900 for each child who is in the care of the Local Authority (LAC)
- £1900 for each child who have been adopted from care or leaving care under a special guardianship or residence order

It is anticipated that our pupil premium grant for 2014-15 will be £16500.

The Pupil Premium funding that is received by our school is used in a variety of ways in order to improve pupil attainment and to help overcome barriers to learning. We strive to ensure that all children who are entitled to pupil premium grant make at least two sub-levels, i.e. more than expected progress in Reading, Writing and Maths, each school year.

Within the budget planning since pupil premium was introduced, there are and have been certain areas of spending identified specifically to raise outcomes and attainment for the pupils who receive pupil premium entitlement. The needs of these pupils have been assessed and the following list identifies how this category of funding will be used;

- increased and targeted TA support (individual or group)
- TA on yard in the morning to "meet and greet"
- TA targeted family support
- Provision of homework club, maths club and other clubs at lunchtime
- Attendance at breakfast club
- 1 to 1 / small group maths provision
- Programme of lunchtime clubs
- Parent workshops
- Music tuition
- School uniform
- Contributions to trips and visits including Arthog.

During 2014-15, we will be using some funding to train a member of staff as a learning mentor to target support and ensure progress.

The impact of these vary from one pupil to another and includes;

- increased confidence
- increased support with learning - raised achievement in Maths and Literacy
- greater engagement in a wide range of activities
- increased participation in a variety of activities
- parent support helps parents engage more with their child's learning, makes school more approachable and consequently raises achievement and self esteem for both parents and pupils
- support with homework

(violin, woodwind, percussion, recorder, orchestra, choir)</p>	<p>£1340 Continue the provision</p>	<p>This is to enable identified children the opportunity to learn to play an instrument, which may not otherwise have been possible without financial assistance being provided. The provision of an instrument will enable children to practise at home, helping to ensure they make good progress in their learning between each lesson. The children, who learn to play instruments, greatly enjoy being able to play music and develop their musical skill on the instrument of their choice. Wherever possible they are encouraged to play in extra-curricular opportunities such as instrumental workshops, Christmas performances, orchestra etc. Children's participation in such events provides an enormous boost to children's confidence and self-esteem.</p>
<p>£2000 to provide 1:1 tuition with a qualified teacher for target group of children.</p>	<p>£2000 To continue the provision</p>	<p>The school tracks the progress and attainment of all children very closely. 1:1 tuition is being provided for those children who are identified as being at risk of not making expected progress, and who may therefore benefit from 1:1 tuition with a qualified teacher on specific areas of the curriculum. The 1:1 teacher works very closely with each child's class teacher to ensure that a programme of learning is developed that specifically targets areas identified as being in need of further improvement. It is hoped that this intensive support will help children 'catch-up' and meet their personalised targets for attainment and progress.</p>

<p>£1167 to provide additional teaching assistants to provide specific intervention and support programmes to individual children.</p>	<p>£2600 To continue and extend this provision</p>	<p>Teachers identify pupils who do not receive home support with reading and homework for additional support in school. The school's SENCo has identified pupils who may benefit from additional literacy or numeracy support/intervention programmes. Children work 1:1 or in small groups with their allocated teaching assistant regularly throughout each week. Regular assessments of progress take place to ensure that programmes of work being delivered are helping children to make progress in their learning. The teaching assistants liaise regularly with each child's class teacher to ensure that identified needs are being met.</p>
<p>£330 to provide financial assistance to families in paying for Yr 6 residential trips.</p>	<p>£120 to provide financial assistance to families in paying for trips and visits including Yr 6 residential trips.</p>	<p>This financial support will enable a number of children in yr 6, who are eligible for the Pupil Premium, to attend the residential trip; Arthog Outdoor Education Centre. Without this financial assistance these children may have been unable to take part in this trip alongside their peers. Parents of pupils eligible for Pupil Premium are not asked for Voluntary contributions towards trips and visits.</p>
<p>£2375 to provide access to extra-curricular activities that promote children's all-round education. After school clubs</p>	<p>£2300 (lunchtime) To continue this provision £1200 after school clubs £76 specialist clubs</p>	<p>Pupils gain enormous enjoyment from extra-curricular and enrichment activities and learn a great deal from the numerous activities that are provided throughout the year. This includes the provision of a programme of lunchtime clubs, after school clubs and specialist clubs.</p>
<p>£900 Homework and Maths Club provision</p>	<p>£900 To continue this provision</p>	<p>To support pupils learning</p>
